Nutrition, Enterprise Recovery and Gender Based Violence(GVB) in the partnership with CARE Nepal, WWF Nepal, LWR, CRS, Save The Children, UNICEF, UNDP, UNFPA, PAF, JSDF and Raleigh International. SSICDC Gorkha is helping the communities for building a culture of disaster risk reduction awareness and preparedness as well as helping to ensure all reconstruction is done with a approach of build back better, safer and Greener.

## Background and Introduction

Shree Swanra Integrated Community Development Centre (SSICDC) Gorkha is a non-political, non-governmental and non-profit making community based organization established on 2044 B.S with a vision of the future society where people's rights are fully respected with opportunities to lead a productive, happy and dignified human life.

The overall programs coverage of the organization are community health and sanitation education, Disaster Risk Reduction and Management, Climate Change Adaptation and Mitigation, maternal and child health mobile clinic in coordination with DPHO (District Public Health Office), Sub-Health post, Health Post, conflict transformation and peace building, drinking water supply and sanitation, adult and child education, women empowerment, micro finance, farmers managed irrigation, income generation through Climate Smart agriculture and forest resource management, Alternative Energy Promotion, community managed infrastructures like wooden bridge building, child development, reproductive health, child and women rights, gender issues and social inclusion.

With the goal of meaningful contribution to improve the quality of life of rural backward communities of Nepal, SSICDC works to encourage people's participation in development process through capacity building of the communities. It supports local initiative to create a better future of the rural

backward communities. This will be attempted through strengthening the civil society, especially the users groups complementing the local government efforts.

25th April, 2015- Saturday proved to be historic and is marked as the day when Nepal was hit by a massive earthquake of magnitude 7.8 on the Richter scale, the epicenter being at Gorkha- around 80 km north west of the capital city, Kathmandu. Another earthquake measuring 7.3 magnitude followed on 12th May 2015, a combined effect of both caused severe damage to 14 districts out of 75 including Gorkha, Sindhupalchowk, Nuwakot, Dolakha and Rasuwa districts. According to latest authoritative data, 8,702 dead, 22,493 injured, 202,157 buildings fully and 214,202 buildings partially damaged.

In Gorkha district, total of 443 died and 952 were injured, out of 66,506 households, 59,527 are fully damaged and 13,428 are partially damaged. The northern VDCs of Gorkha district are extremely remote, hard to reach and at high risk of cold/winter.

Thousands of villages have been devastated, with up to 95% of personal and office buildings, clinics and schools in some districts brought to ground. As of an official estimate, more than two million dollars property has spoiled by this Nepal earthquake BS 2072. In the 14 worst affected districts, 600,000 homes were destroyed and another 280,000 badly damaged. After the devastating earthquake of 25 April 2015, SSICDC





from the phase of emergency response is working in all VDCs of Gorkha district with the Mutual coordination with Save the Children, CRS, CARE Nepal, LWR, UNDP, and DDC Project. SSICDC launched the earthquake response program in the collaboration with save the children International in different VDCs of Gorkha, where distribution of NFIs, Shelter kits, ECHO cash support and masons training were accomplished successfully under the close coordination with DDRC, DUDBC and DDC Gorkha. All the activities carried out under SSICDC were targeted to benefit the marginalized group specially children and pregnant and lactating mothers since they are more vulnerable to impacts of Earthquake under 6 major themes: Child Protection, Education, Food Security and Livelihood, Shelter, Health and Nutrition, WASH and Social Protection.

- Improve rural Infrastructure facilities like foot trails, trail bridges, micro irrigation, micro hydropower, community buildings and rural roads

etc.

- Promote saving and credit & Co-operative.
- Develop and promote appropriate technologies in rural area.
- Develop, disseminate and promote renewable energy technologies in rural area.
- Conserve environment and natural resources & encourage its sustainable use.
- Institutional strengthening.
- Create the employment opportunities through various income generating and vocational training.
- Organize the awareness program and other different social, economic and educational programs for the enhancement of marginalized group.
- Conduct the programs for the improvement of livelihood focused on tourism, livestock and herbs with medicinal importance.

### **Executive Summary**

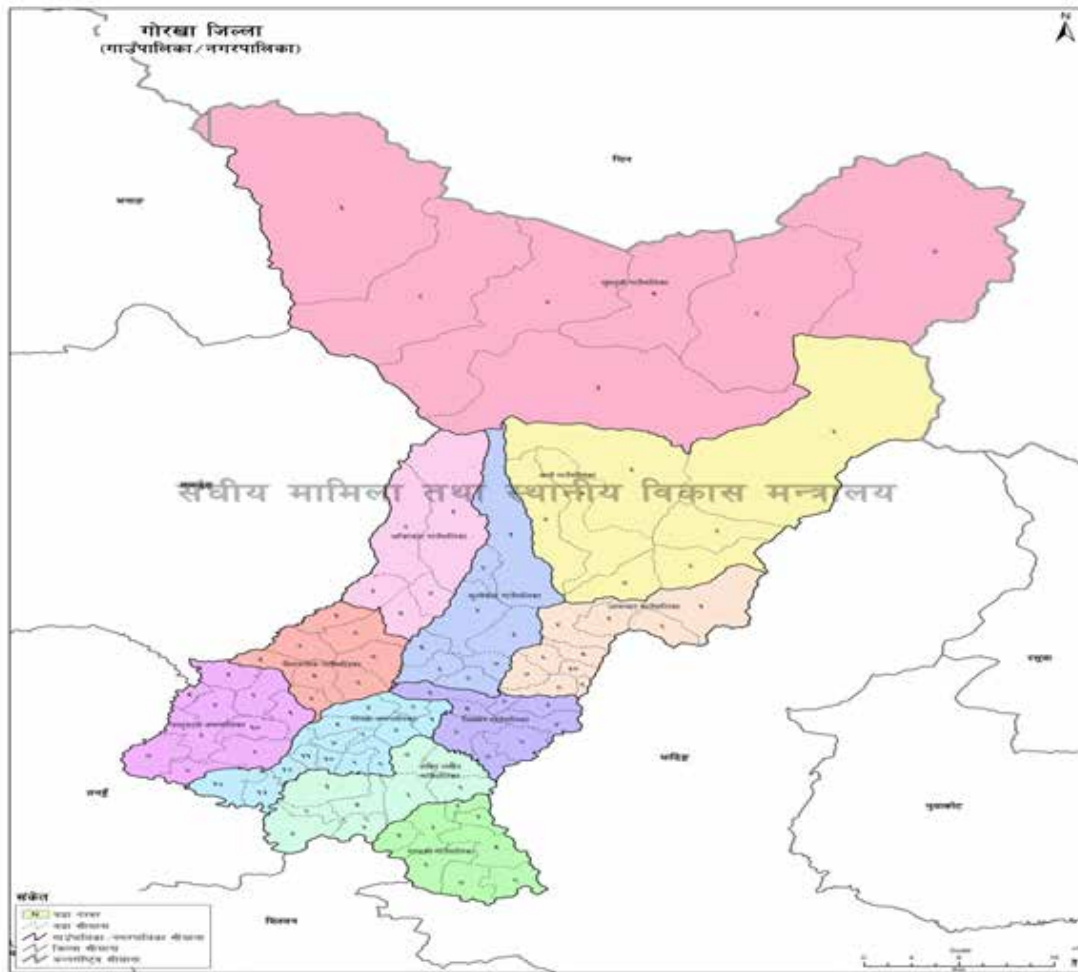
SSICDC Gorkha had close to 200000 people who became its development partners at individual level benefitting community in health nutrition, education, protection, livelihood and disaster management and response. The deadly earthquake of April 2015 affected the overall aspect of Gorkha and Nepal as a whole. Being the epicenter of the deadly earthquake, Gorkha was one of the most affected district of Nepal. With the help of national and international development partners SSICDC initiated the holistic approach of enhancing the life of people including their wellbeing in shelter, livelihood, DRR, WASH, protection, education and strengthening capacity of CBOs and support to establish referral mechanism.

In 2017 and 2018 we made our deliberate move towards focusing on the recovery and rehabilitation of the earthquake victims in collaboration with our national and international partners and donors. We made a strong hand agreement with our various donors like; Care Nepal,

Save The Children, Catholic Relief Services (CRS) and Lutheran World Relief (LWR) for the rescue, relief and recovery of the earthquake victims along with other donors like GOI supported Nepal Housing Reconstruction Project in Partnership with UNDP/ ODR, UNDP/ CILRP, Raleigh International, UNICEF, WWF, PAF, JSDF, UNFPA, ICDF etc. Rescue and recovery operation was conducted with rapid initiation for life saving and to recover the suffering of the earthquake victims. Child protection policy, gender policy and financial guideline were followed fully for ensuring accountability and transparency during emergency as a humanitarian organization.

## Thematic Progress and Interventions

### Shelter:

Shree Swanra Integrated Community Development Centre has given a vital importance to reconstruction of safer shelter in partnership with its international donors in line with the government guideline and policy after the devastating earthquake and was able to transfer cash support to earthquake affected community. We are working in capacity building through orientation, trainings and mass awareness activities on earthquake resilient safe shelter construction and financial and technical support to household for the construction of permanent shelter in support of Save the Children, Catholic Relief Services, Care Nepal, UNDP/ODRC and LVR. The main aim is to support beneficiaries in recovery and reconstruction of their shelter according to Government of Nepal reconstruction policies. Similarly all targeted beneficiaries enhanced their skills and knowledge in building back safer constructions through “on the job” training and mass awareness.

In partnership with CRS, following were the achievements in erstwhile Aruchanaute, Aruarbang, Lapu, Manbu, Tandrang and Thumi VDC's of Gorkha District

- Unskilled Mason Training 4 events and covered 40 masons
- Construction of a Demo House at Aruchanaute
- 14 events of 7 days skilled mason training which covered 274 masons to support reconstruction
- 2 days refreshment training to Masons which covered 40 masons in refreshing them with the EQ resistant house construction guidelines of National reconstruction Authority (NRA)
- 41 SMM/BCM Latrine Construction
- Door to door socio-technical assistance for safe shelter reconstruction of 5589 HHs

### WASH:

WASH is one of the major themes of SSICDC. WASH is the collective term for water Sanitation and hygiene. Due to their interdependent nature these three core issues are grouped together to

represent a growing sector. While each a separate field of work, each is dependent on the presence of the other. 2015 April 25th gigantic earthquake, most of houses and the school were fully damaged. Along with the houses and school its latrine, drinking water supply system were also damaged. The damage of water supply affected the access of people to clean drinking water and sanitation.

6 Drinking water schemes; Lakure DWSS at Tandrang, Komrang DWSS at Manbu, Simara Mangaltar DWSS at Aruchanaute, Litkhola DWSS at Aaruarbang, Baguwakhet DWSS at Tandrang and

Litepani DWSS at Thumi established out of targeted 18 schemes

- 1501 HHs benefited with Hygiene promotion sessions
- Water quality test at 150 HHs
- Day Celebration; World Water day celebrated in fiscal year 2017/18

Similarly WASH reconstruction Intervention Round -3 in coordination with CARE Nepal targeted 8770 earthquake affected as well as



population who have acute need of water focusing on poor, vulnerable and socially excluded (PVSE) community focusing on female headed HHs and differently able population.

The expected outputs of the project were:

- Improved access and meaningful representation in the management of safe, adequate and resilient drinking water systems for targeted communities
- Community members have improved knowledge, attitudes and practices related to sanitation & hygiene there by reducing prevalence of water borne diseases
- Local Government have improved knowledge and information on water



sources & existing drinking water schemes

- Established linkage of the vulnerable disaster affected communities with local government for self-recovery and have enhanced capacity for sustainable local WASH planning & monitoring

The key achievements under the project are listed below:

- Water discharge measured after Vulnerability Need Assessment (VNA) of UCPVA and survey of water schemes completed at Palungtar Municipality, Siranchok, Ajirkot and Barpak-Sulikot Rural Municipality
- Project started with district level startup meeting and local level startup meetings at Palungtar Municipality, Siranchok, Ajirkot and Barpak-Sulikot Rural Municipality followed by community level consultative meetings Similarly Community WASH Recovery to vulnerable Community in Gorkha in coordination with CARE Nepal did wash related activities at Chumnubri, Dharche, Aarughat, Siranchok RM and Palungtar Municipality. Following are the completed activities under the project on those targeted areas:
- Water quality testing of water sources and PoU after completion of 17 scheme construction
- 2 schemes of systemization and support for yard connection
- Hazard map and mitigation plan preparation
- Revisit of water safety plan by ensuring climate resilience in 17 schemes

- One Staff training on GESI and enhancing meaningful women participation
- Training to all women members including Chairperson and treasurer (if not women) on leadership/account keeping a record keeping on all 17 schemes
- Upgrade water systems for productive use of surplus and waste water in coordination with FSL

Some achievements completing those activities are as follows:

- 3 years O & M plan of UCs is constructed
- Tariff collection by UCs is initiated
- Care taker is appointed by UC for regular maintenance work.
- Increase access on safe & pure drinking water
- Waste & surplus water is used for productive use / develop the kitchen garden
- Relation between FEDWASUN & UCs established through district level coordination meeting

- Leadership of some UC member increased through different trainings. Some of the UC member was elected from local level election. Chairperson of Khurpajung elected as ward chairperson & 2 member from Chunkhola DWS elected as ward member.
- 74 vulnerable HHs have increased access on improving sanitation through door to door assistant & sanitation support

### Food Security and Livelihood

In Emergency and recovery phase Food Security and Livelihoods theme helps families meet their basic needs and protect their livelihoods. This approach help families create an economically stable and food secure home.

In an emergency, food security and livelihood programs are critical in saving people's lives and livelihoods. Immediately following a crisis, SSICDC provides vulnerable families resources to meet their immediate needs, including food, fuel, staple items, and items needed to

restart livelihoods. Livelihood of majority of the rural community in Gorkha relies on agriculture. Due to severe damage to the CIs due to earthquake the livelihoods of the community were under serious threat. The CIs are relatively simple but its function benefits and services are often central to the survival and economic sustainability of the community .It is therefore outmost important to reconstruct the damaged CIs to maintain and foster the livelihood and enhance socio-economic recovery of the affected communities in the district. SSICDC works with community to generate temporary employment opportunities through cash-for-work or food-for-work projects that result in strengthening community assets. Temporary employment projects have multiple benefits, first by providing financial resources necessary for vulnerable families to meet their basic needs, and secondly, by establishing public works projects that benefit the community.

In Partnership with CRS following progresses were observed in fiscal year

- Wool extracting machine, comb and scissor has been used for preparing radi, pakhi and bakkhnu

- Systemized and well managed record keeping of financial statement by the agri-cooperatives.
- Active participation of women at agri-cooperatives and farmers group, and even on decision making positions
- 14 females have started their business on handmade paper, after getting 60 days of training.
- Nettle powder production is getting regularity, however, intermittent power
- Supply is drawing back full functioning of the enterprise.

## Health/SRMH/Family Planning

Health and Nutrition program focuses on increasing mothers', newborns', children's and adolescent's access to health care services. We work closely with the Government's line agencies to ensure that every people can beat preventable and treatable illnesses and they get nutrition to survive and grow. In context of emergency various health institutions like health post were damaged which hamper the people's basic right to health. IN support of international and national partners SSICDC have made significant achievement in the sector of health and nutrition.

SSICDC implemented BISHWASH project in coordination with CARE Nepal and HARTMANN aiming to improve access to health services, including maternal health, in the targeted communities in remote areas and to improve access to safe drinking water and crucial information on good sanitation and hygiene practices for members of the targeted villages. The project covered erstwhile Harmi, Gankhu, Simjung, Barpak, Laprak and Uhiya VDC's of Gorkha district.

Major achievements and activities of BISHWASH project in the fiscal year 2017/18 are as follows:

- Construction of model gender-responsive Primary Healthcare Outreach Clinics (PHC-ORCs) in Harmi and Gankhu in which there is separate toilet for male and female; ensured water supply and well set up WASH facilities

- Necessary equipment related to healthcare and management such as examination bed-1, screen-1, Office table-1 and chair-1 for health service provider and waiting chairs for the patients-20 pcs, weighing machine-2, BP set-1, dressing equipment set, first aid kit, stretcher-1, cupboard-1 etc. and WASH related equipment such as Buckets for waste disaggregation etc. were supported to both the PHC-ORC in Gankhu and Harmi.
- 620 HH, Approximately 3100 Population will be benefited from 3 big RCC Reservoir Tank of high scale of 80 Cubic Meter, 60 Cubic Meter, 28 Cubic Meter; community water supply construction and renovation. The source of water will be taken from the BoudhaHimal and it will cater to newly constructed NRN building for Laprak people.

- Establishing of and/or orientation to gender-balanced PHC-ORC, during the training in 5 venue, 72 people took participation. Out of them, majorities were female (45 female). According

to ethnicity majority of them were Janajati (52 people). There were 7 Dalit members in the committee.

- Supporting the conduction of satellite clinics to provide Long Acting Family Planning (LAFP) services at remote VDCs; Satellite clinics have been conducted in Chhoprak-1, Gankhu-1, Saurpani-2, Barpak-1 and Machhakhola-1 so far. 85 Female and 8 Male community members have received services from these FP camps. The project has capacitated health workers in all the health facilities in the project VDCs in order to improve the LAFP services provided within them. The project emphasizes the community people to seek LAFP service from the existing health facilities and PHC ORCs. Marie stops and DPHO is also conducting similar activities in these VDCs
- Support institutionalization of the Community Score Board system in targeted VDCs; Formation of Health Mother Groups (HMGs) in all 54 wards has been completed. Similarly Training program for health mothers



group on SATH has been transformed into a regular activity where an orientation on SATH is provided to the entire mothers group in the entire project VDCs every month during their meetings. Implementation of SATH program in all 6 VDCs of Gorkha (Harmi, Simjung, Barpak and Laprak VDCs) is completed.

- Support institutionalization of the Community Score Board system in targeted VDCs; All together there were total 520 participants in 6 VDCs. Out of them 13 were adolescent girls of under 19 age. Similarly 319 women of reproductive age group were participated in the program where 188 male were involved during mass awareness meeting of CHSB program.
- Health Facility Operation and Management Committee (HFOMC) Training: Total 76 members of HFOMC has got training. Out of them 36 Janajati and 11 Dalit were participated in the training. We have trained 2 times for the HFOMC of Gankhu and 1 time for other HFOMC (Total 7 event). There were 29 female and 47 male participants in the training. Similarly Supporting Access to Family Planning and Post Abortion Care (SAFPAC) in Gorkha project in coordination with CARE Nepal was an initiative to reduce unintended pregnancies and deaths from obstetric complications, including unsafe abortion, through the integration of essential reproductive health services. The approach was for integrating the

Minimum Initial Service Package (MISP) into CARE's emergency response programming and also strengthening reproductive health programming. This program was implemented in 5 HFs, their catchment areas and 2 referral hospitals of Gorkha district of Nepal. It facilitated 5 HFs and their catchment areas – Gankhu HP, Chhoprak HP, Barpak HP, Saurpani HP, Kerabari HP, and two hospitals District Hospital and Aamp-Pipal Hospital.

### **The objectives of the projects were:**

- Improve collaboration with Ministry of Health, Communities and other humanitarian actors
- Increase the number of modern FP users with emphasis on LARC
- To ensure 100% of women and girls who come to the health facility in need of comprehensive abortion care receive high quality services
- Build capacity of the district hospital as a center of excellence on SRH, particularly for Safe Abortion Care
- Ensure supported health facilities have appropriate supplies, medicines and equipment and a well-functioning supply system to do so.
- Increase the performance of individuals and facilities, including use of data for decision-making

### **The major activities and achievements of the project SAFPAC are:**

- 32 mother group meetings at community reached 1526 mothers



- 10 events of community events were completed with male involvement and reached 382 families
- 81 school adolescent children were sensitized on FP PAC
- Also 5 traditional healers were sensitized on FP PAC
- 123 defaulters were followed-up regularly
- 289 individuals were oriented on Medical Abortion
- 123 home visited for follow up of defaulters and sanitization of FP PAC
- 45 FCHVs were trained on communication and facilitation skills
- 70 FCHV's and health trainers were provided with VCAT trainings
- 6 events of onsite (HMIS) coaching was completed
- 80 facilitators were provided with quality improvement trainings
- 12 facilitators were coached on on-site IUCD implantation

Similarly the Nepal Earthquake Response Project Pool Fund SRMH supported by CARE Nepal was implemented with the objectives of support the people of Gorkha especially women and girls in the remote areas comprehensive quality reproductive health and protection services by organizing comprehensive RH camps & To improve the capacity of health workers to deliver safe and quality services by providing infection prevention training and required infection prevention and waste management set up in health facilities.

The project was implemented in erstwhile Harmi, Gankhu, Simjung, Saurpani, Kerabari, Laprak, Chhoprak and Uhiya VDC's of Gorkha district. Three successful RH camps were completed in Barpak, Saurpani and Machhakhola in which Uterine Prolapse cases were identified among 42 people; 171 were gone with ultrasound, 100 gone with ANC with ultrasound and found 3 positive cases in VIA screening out of total 1051 registered cases. Similarly Out of total 94 screened cases, 75 were total Uterine Prolapse Cases, 18 Hysterectomy cases, 39 Ring Pessary Cases and 22 other cases. Also 226 male and female individuals were facilitated by various methods of FP like implantation of IUCDs, pills, Dipo, Minilap, Vasectomy, etc.

### **Education and Infrastructure:**

Education is one of the Major themes of the SSICDC. SSICDC believes in making the education in the reach of every individual. SSICDC always advocates for the free and compulsory in reach of

every individual and society in context of the emergency all the aspect of the society were destroyed and education institution were no exception to it. SSICDC made a deliberate effort to sustain and retain the education in reach of every individual. In 2017 and 2018 SSICDC have made a significant achievement in sector of education. Some of the significant achievements are:

1. 8 numbers of permanent school building constructed having 64 class rooms.
2. Teachers, SMC/PTA school management training provided in 64 schools.
3. Provide different training for Quality Learning Environment.
4. Support for school DRR plan preparation.
5. Provide training on universal design for accessibility to 103 teacher of 25 schools
6. Provide rollout training to teachers on inclusive education from where 145 teachers trained via 8 events.
7. 169 SMC/PTA members including the parents of disable children trained

- on rollout training to SMC/PTA on disable friendly school environment.
8. Providing rollout training to child club on creating disable friendly school environment from which 81 child club member trained.
9. Provide small grant support to 13 schools to construct the disable friendly infrastructure.
10. Teaching learning materials support for child with disability as per need.
11. Provide support to strengthen district resource centres or classes as need basis.
12. Conduct mobile disability screening camp from where 62 children benefited.
13. Provide assistive device to 15 children
14. Exchange/ exposure visit of SMC/PTA and resource teachers
15. Development of individual education plan of child with disability.

### Protection (GBV, SAFE Justice)

SSICDC have also given importance to the strengthening of community based protection mechanism to ensure the protection of women and children. Taking the crucial scenario of abuse neglect and discrimination in the society SSICDC believes in equal opportunity and equal access to service and justice to all groups of people of the community. Some of the major achievements in the theme are

- Identified 54 poverty pocket area, 162 REFLECT groups formed and class conducting smoothly as well as 108 CJRP, 113 REFLECT



Management Committee Formed through underline courses of Poverty vulnerable Assessment(UCAPVA Tools) and Participatory Well Being Ranking(PWBR) Tools

- People have Started to Share their fillings emotion, sorrow and grief during the REFLECT Session without any hesitation and express this is the real place for sharing own bitter experience.
- REFLECT participants Decided to repair and improve Foot trail which was not repair since many years.

- Started to claim and receive target budget from the ward office which was not known properly its process.
- Ownership from the elected body and active participation during the initial phase of Project activities to till date.
- Identify genuine issues related to traditional social norms through REFLECT Class.

### Referral mechanism:

Women in Nepal have limited mobility and access to resources due to patriarchal nature of Nepalese society. Consequently, women are not only exposed to GBV but are also unaware of referral services available in the community. It remains essential that the community people are well aware about the referral system available in their community. SSICDC provided information to GBV survivors, especially vulnerable women and adolescent girls about the existing referral services. 8 people were financially supported and many more were provided with technical suggestions for referral. Among the 8 cases that have received the support, 2 referral cases received citizenship card from Barpak, 3 cases got disability card from Harmi and 3 cases of pregnant women from Barpak VDC referred to District Hospital for getting emergency obstetric service. Altogether 17 cases being referred to different agencies. Similarly 6 community mobilizers were trained on GBV protection and awareness measures.

SSICDC disseminated messages on GBV issues such as, legal implications of early marriage as stated in the newly promulgated constitution, referral services available, legal implications of polygamy, issues of rape and domestic violence, among others, and ways to mitigate them. These programs reached 2768 beneficiaries (1005 males and 1763 females). To aware & sensitize the community people on GBV volunteer were mobilized at community level. Volunteer were trained on psychosocial first aid, referral & case management. Through this they disseminate the message on referral mechanism and GBV in community. 184 community people receive psychosocial service. SSICDC also organized 8 episode of Community Theater for rising awareness on GBV issues.

DRR is a systematic approach to identifying, assessing and reducing the risks of disaster. It aims to reduce socio-economic vulnerabilities to disaster as

increasing risk is the lack of a favorable policy and legal environment commensurate with the present-day situation, needs, opportunities and resource. In context of emergency, SSICDC in Collaboration with its partners have initiated to institutionalize DRR in community level through LDMC Formation and its endorsement through RM/M Assembly. SSICDC Gorkha supported to the RM/M and communities to form WDMC, LDMC, provide training on CADRE, RRT, LDRP with the coordination

## Address on Climate Change

SSICDC Gorkha Implemented Hariyo Ban Program in partnership with CARE Nepal and WWF and funded from USAID. Based on past experience of last three years, SSICDC has been selected as a local implementing partner for the implementation of Hariyo Ban Program's biodiversity conservation, governance, livelihood, REDD and Climate Change Adaptation related activities in Daraudi River corridor by WWF Nepal which is prime grantee of Hariyo Ban Program.

This project covers all three components of Hariyo Ban Program namely Biodiversity conservation, Sustainable landscapes and Climate change Mitigation and adaptation. Meantime, governance, livelihoods, gender and social inclusion are important cross-cutting themes for all activities. To address governance and gender issues, Hariyo Ban program will support community institutions to assess their internal governance by using participatory governance assessment tools, analyzing the level of participation of marginalized groups in

management structure and in planning, implementation and monitoring groups' activities. Community forest guidelines, 2065 also provides opportunity to reform the groups and make them more inclusive. This program will build capacity of community institutions to increase meaningful and inclusive participation for equitable benefit sharing and services. For the Sustainable Landscape component, CARE will support to organize and activate old Community Learning and Action Centers (CLACs) in priority and focused areas. High dependency on forests for fuel wood collection, forest fire, invasive species, over grazing, lack of awareness and infrastructure development are the major drivers of deforestation and forest degradation in Daraudi Corridor of Gorkha. Banmara is one of the most dominant invasive species that has caused deforestation and forest degradation in this area. The proposed follow up CLAC activity is also expected to identify and adopt community based measures to address the drivers of deforestation and forest degradation in working site. Activities proposed in the Climate Change Adaptation components are climate change awareness, CAPA implementation and mainstreaming activities of CAPA into other development plan. These activities will help to increase resilience capacity of climate vulnerable communities in sustained way.

## Nepal AawasPunanirman Support Program



Retrofitting of Earthquake affected house

Nepal was hit by a devastating earthquake in April 2015 killing about 9,000 individuals and damaging over 800,000

houses. The Government allocated NRs. 300000 grants for each affected family, disbursed in 3 installments, to assist the rebuilding effort. First tranche NRs 50000 for the completion of foundations. Second tranche NRs 150000 for the building structure and walls up to roof band and Third tranche NRs 100000 for completing the roof and toilet. But unfortunately most of the beneficiaries get first tranche just before big festival Dashain and Tihar and had expense the amount to celebrate the festival because they had lost their all food and had nothing to eat at all. So SSICDC Gorkha started leveraging Government Fund for housing reconstruction with providing different types of support in partnership with various funding partners( Save the Children, LWR, CRS, CARE Nepal, NHRP/ UNDP/ODRC) for the families who left behind.

Four years after the earthquake, a little over 40% of the affected families have



completed their homes, while many still live in temporary shelters, their unsafe damaged houses, or with family members. Among the families who have not been able to rebuild are the most vulnerable households: single female-headed families, Child Headed, the elderly, orphans, and the economically deprived. These groups lack resources and technical knowledge to rebuild and comply with the administrative burdens of the government's reconstruction program. Within Gorkha, SSICDC has identified more than 1242 such families together with NRA and DDRC Gorkha. Nepal's new constitution, approved in 2015, states that housing is a fundamental right of all citizens. Federal and local governments are now seeking opportunities to improve housing quality for the poorest, vulnerable and most marginalized populations. Deteriorating health, a continued sense of insecurity and no place for children to study continue to be a challenge for these households.

SSICDC Gorkha provides direct support to such families through top-up grants for construction materials and labor as well as Socio Technical Facilitation. Most importantly, these families receive technical assistance and guidance to navigate the reconstruction process. We also provide the support on building permit process through building permit studio in Gorkha and Palungtar Municipalities of Gorkha.
